VSNA-NC is working towards becoming a partner in our Shimoga(Shivamogga) hospital. People of VSNA believe in dasoha which means surrender to community service.

VSNA-NC members are not new to the cause. Many of them have been our longtime donors. Last year under the presidency of Ravi Handyal, they raised \$2,000 for Bangalore hospital. ### Bangalore Hospital – Closer to reality and set to open!-Kumar Rajan

Earlier this year, I had the good fortune to visit the Bangalore hospital's site and experience the progress first hand.



It was my last work day in Bangalore, and I was set to leave the next day. The meeting was running late, and my one chance to visit the hospital site before sunset seemed to be slowly slipping away. The

meeting was finally over and when I exited the building, it was still light, but I only had about 30 minutes to before night fall. I had no real address – just an approximate idea that it was somewhere on the long Airport-Whitefield Road. Luckily, I speak decent Kannada, having lived in Bangalore during my college days. So I jumped into a rick (still the fastest mode of transport if you know the side roads) and asked the driver to take me "there". He was quite skeptical that we would even find it with no street address, but I wanted to give it a shot. I guess he knew that I had to be dropped back in town so his main concern was allayed.

We got going and started to whiz past familiar landmarks – the aiport, HAL, etc. That gave way to the bustling Marathahalli area. Think of Marathahalli as Gilroy - only with about 10 times more crowd and traffic. There are a lot of big "outlet" stores nearby. It is very busy and active and there are already road expansion projects underway there. We finally crossed the last main landmark - railway bridge - and we still had not found it. Most locals have not heard about "Nava Jeevana Nilaya" – the trust that donated the land to us. And so we plugged on, and by now it was nearly sunset.

Then suddenly to my left, I saw the sign! I literally ran in to make sure we had the right location – and soon discovered that I had. It

was buzzing with activity, with the foundation for A and B blocks complete. The concrete pouring was to happen at 8:30 PM. The construction workers were toiling hard and everything was running like clockwork. I was personally received by the foreman, Mr. Basavappa, and he proudly showed me the progress they



had made. He was verv enthusiastic and he has internally visualized all the next steps to get the building up. We are going to build the ground floor plus one upper floor, but the foundation is rated for up to 4

floors. The lot itself is very big and he gave me a full walk through. He is confident that we can be up and operational in 6 months. According to him, all the tedious parts are done, and the next steps will be relatively more routine.

This is a great areait is literally a 15 minute drive away from the edge of the current airport runway, and you may be able to see the site at takeoff or landing.

AP folks have been through all this excitement before, but this was a first for me. So there you have it - it is real, and I have no doubt that the building itself will be there waiting for us in about 6 months.

### \$200K+ Raised at Bangalore Founder's Dinner- Hema Chamraj

SEF fundraising event at the Santa Clara Marriott Hotel Nov. 17, 2006 organized to raise funds for the building of its new hospital in Bangalore was a stunning success. Dr. R.V.



Ramani, the managing trustee for Sankara Eye Hospitals in India was one of the speakers for the evening and he shared a

message of heartbreaking simplicity that unnecessary blindness in India must, will, and be vanquished in our lifetimes. Today, one fourth of the world's blind population lives in India; two million new cataract cases are added every



year, noted Dr. Ramani. The reasons cataracts are on the rise are fourfold, he said: Diabetes is on the rise in India; the tropical weather is believed to be a factor; there is an excess of harmful UV rays; and Indians are believed to be genetically predisposed. "The World Health Organization says that by

2015, one in four of the world's diabetics will be in India," he said.

The other speaker for the evening was Mr. B.V. Jagadeesh, one of the Sankara Eye Foundation's largest donors with a pledge of \$100,000 at the Nov. 17 gala alone. A cofounder of



Exodus, he now serves as a group vice president for Citrix, a global leader in application delivery infrastructure.

"Just like education, eyesight is fundamental," Jagadeesh said. "That's what triggered

the excitement about Sankara for me. "It's not just the social aspect of it, but the socio-economic aspect that is interesting. People who get their vision back get back to work, and start to earn money, helping other people, instead of being dependent."

### **Donors Cornor -** Ashim Mehta

Born on October 1st 1950 to a High Court judge in Madhya Pradesh, Nayna Seth was truly a gift from God to every one who came across her path. A vivacious child, she was extremely fond of singing and dancing. In March 1969, newly-wed Nayna turned down an opportunity to sing on the All India Radio network and immigrated to USA with her husband Rohit Seth. Upon Arrival in New York, Nayna worked at various odd jobs to augment the family income. In 1972, Nayna and Rohit left for California, where Rohit began his career as an engineer.

In 1980, Nayna developed gestational diabetes- a disease that affects roughly 4% of pregnant women. Though the disease often goes away after child-birth, it did not in Nayna's case. Nayna also suffered from osteoporosis and blindness. On July 18th 2006, Nayna died from complications caused by recurring infections. Despite the pain and problems in her life, Nayna was a source of joy and delight to all who came across her. Her conversations always focused on the well being of her visitors rather than on her own difficulties. As her daughter Nila says, "My mother was the light of our lives that shone on us and will now shine through us." Nayna is survived by husband Rohit, daughter Nila and sons Milan and Sanjog.



### God's Mercy across all Religions-Naushik Desai

S. K. Saleem is ecstatic. Brimming with newfound confidence, his enthusiasm is infectious. He cannot believe his luck. It is as if he has been freed from the shackles of darkness and dreary times - literally.

He is 42 years old and lives with his parents, wife



and two children in a rural community in Govindapuram. For quite some years he had been working as a welder in the village. Unfortunately, two years ago he lost his sight in one eye and his job too. Although he began driving an auto rickshaw, his failing vision only made matters worse, resulting in frequent accidents.

Forced to give up this means of livelihood, Saleem had no choice but to sit at home. To make ends meet his wife was compelled to work as a housemaid. Meanwhile, Saleem contacted eye surgeons near Guntur (no facilities are available near his village). Upon diagnosis, cataract was detected in his right eye with a poor vision of 3/60. Surgery would cost Rs. 5,000, he was told. But such a sum was out of reach to him, given his financial conditions. No progress was made and a desolate Saleem, once the breadwinner of the family and now dependent on his wife's meager earnings, was reduced to a state of helplessness.

However, his fortunes changed when his wife's employer who was aware of Sankara's work at Guntur, recommended it to Saleem. At the same time, in God's scheme of things, Sankara held a camp at Govindapuram on the 31st December of 2006. Saleem came to know about it through announcements. Things fell in place - Saleem was selected for cataract surgery, picked up by the Sankara bus and surgery was carried out on January 10th, 2007. His post-operative vision dramatically improved to 6/9.

Now, Saleem envisions a bright and promising future ahead of him. To Sankara, his parting words will always be close to our hearts – "Allah will bless you all."

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#### What a Wonderful World-Naushik Desai

This four-month-old, still to be named, was welcomed

into this world with open arms by Koteswara Rao and his wife Yesu Mary. Their elder son (at a tender age of four) too was excited to have a baby brother. However, this



moment of joy was shattered when the boy's parents noticed that the child was neither seeing them nor was he following the movements in front of his eyes. On close scrutiny of the eyes, they found small white spots in the child's eyes.

Immediately they rushed to the nearest eye clinic in Mangalagiri and were told that the child had cataract in both the eyes. Surgery was a pressing requirement. However, Rao who works as a mason, residing in Chinnakakani (15 kms from the hospital) was not in a position to afford the expenses of the surgery.

### Thank you for your support

The parents were advised by neighbors and friends, who had themselves undergone treatment at Sankara, to take the little infant child only to the Sankara Hospital in Pedakakani. Both of them had heard about the hospital's work and the fact that it was talked of as a good eye hospital for children. And they held their faith in Sankara. Without wasting any time they sought the services of the hospital, where doctors confirmed cataract in both the eyes.

Arrangements were made to perform the surgery under general anesthesia and on January 10th, 2007 the cataract in the right eye was successfully removed. Since the child is less than a year-old, his vision will be aided by glasses. After a year or two, the IOL (Intra Ocular Lens) will be implanted in his eyes.

The beaming parents are more than happy. Their tears of gratitude reflected, in ways that no words could have, of the love and experience they had at the hospital. For now, they are eagerly waiting to return after 15 days for the surgery on the left eye.
