

## **MESSAGE FROM CHAIRMAN, SEF**

Dear Friends,

Warm greetings from San Jose!

The year 2011 was reasonably good for SEF. We raised close to \$3.2M, conducted 1,822 eye camps, performed 140,812 surgeries and treated 338,273 out-patients. This would not have happened without the support of each and every one of you and we are very thankful for that.

Sankara Eye Hospital, Ludhiana is coming up very well and the inauguration is on April 2, 2012. We have raised \$3.92 million so far and only need \$280,000 more to complete this project. We will be acquiring land for our tenth Hospital in Kanpur, UP this month.

I am happy to report that Anil Lal, our long-time supporter, and Padma Parthasarathy, our long-time volunteer, CFO and supporter, have joined the SEF Board.

Our board members Sundarji and Srivatsanji visited from India in February for strategy meetings. We also organized an all-volunteer meeting in Santa Clara that was well attended. One of the main topics of discussion was: "With running nine Hospitals by April this year, how are we going to build eleven more by the year 2020 to achieve our goal of Vision 20/20 by 2020?" Our estimate is that we need to be raising around \$7M to \$8M per year in the next two years if we really want to live up to the goals of Vision 20/20 by 2020. We are setting an aggressive target of raising \$5M this year.

As land acquisition is a challenge, we are planning to

acquire land in three or four states simultaneously and form Focus teams to raise the required funds of around \$4M or so immediately. Whichever project raises more than 70% of the funds, in other words \$2.8M, will get to go first and we will start the hospital construction in that state. In addition to Kanpur, we are also looking at land in Jodhpur, Rajasthan and Raipur, Chhattisgarh. We will be starting the Focus-Rajasthan and Focus-Chhattisgarh initiatives very soon. Along with the Focus-UP team, please let us know if you want to be a part of any of these initiatives.

If we raise the required funds for Focus-UP soon, we can start the construction this year itself and open the hospital next year. It is really exciting, just the thought of a Sankara Eye Hospital in Kanpur next year. Please consider becoming a Founding Donor of Kanpur, Ludhiana, Guntur (expansion), Anand (expansion), Shimoga hospitals or support our popular 'Open an eye a month' program.

Together, let us, eradicate curable blindness in India by 2020 - Vision 20/20 by 2020.

## SANKARA NOT ONLY GIFTS VISION BUT ALSO LIVES

Retinoblastoma is a cancer that affects the eyes of children and infants affecting approximately 1 in 15,000 live births, which work out to an estimated 2,000 new cases of retinoblastoma in India annually. It is the third predominant cancer occurring in childhood. As the cancer grows, it can spread out of the eye and to other parts of the child's body, resulting ultimately in death. In treating retinoblastoma, the first priority is to save the life of the child, then to preserve the vision and thirdly to minimize complications or side effects of the treatment.

As a part of the Nanna Kannu program at the Bangalore Hospital, we have been able to benefit a wide number of children.

The story of Yellava, a two-year child from Jamakhandi village in Gulbarga District, shows how ophthalmologists from the region are utilizing the services of our oncology clinic to provide appropriate care to their patients.

The child had been taken to a local ophthalmologist as the left eye looked enlarged. The doctor prescribed

medications but his condition did not improve. Yellava lived with his grandparents and mother, who was the sole breadwinner as his father had deserted them. The grandfather suggested they visit Hubli as they had heard about an eye hospital there. At the MM Joshi Eye Hospital, the child was diagnosed to have retinoblastoma and referred to Sankara. After two cycles of chemotherapy, the left eye had to be sacrificed. The child had the tumor in his right eye as well. However, the the tumor in his right

ophthalmology at the Karnataka State Conference. The paper described how our community effort works towards achieving Millennium Development Goals as set by WHO (World Health Organization).



## THE RAINBOW PROGRAM - SANKARA'S FOCUS TOWARDS PREVENTION

COMPREHENSIVE PAEDIATRIC EYE CARE PROGRAMME

FOR THE CHILDREN OF KARNATAKA

Prevention is better than the cure. Blindness and severe visual impairment have far reaching social, economic, and personal implications. When it occurs in children, it also poses serious barriers to the development of the child at a formative stage. Without good vision, a child's ability to learn about the world becomes more difficult.

Eye defects when not detected early lead to irreversible

damage and blindness (amblyopia). Children have long productive years and preventing them from becoming blind or visually impaired would be a great contribution to the future of the society.

6% of school-going children have undetected visual defects, which they are not aware of and neither are the teachers nor the parents. To detect the undetected visual defects in school children, Sankara has designed the

Rainbow program. Established in 1992 in Coimbatore, Rainbow is an ongoing preventive eye care program aimed at giving a bright future to visually handicapped children, by diagnosing their visual defects in school and providing them with remedial measures - medical and surgical free of cost.

The Rainbow Program takes place in government schools, where most children come from poor families, with little or hardly any access to healthcare, leave alone an eye check up.

This unique program involves teachers, to do the first level of screening, followed by technically qualified

optometrists at the second level and eye surgeons in the final phase. Timely remedial measures like spectacles or medical or surgical management are provided for these children. Rainbow caters to the age group of 6-18 years.

It is gratifying to know that over 40 lakh children have been screened so far by the Sankara Eye Care Institutions, India. This highly rewarding preventive eye care

program has been replicated in all the Sankara Eye Hospitals and also in other developing countries like Nigeria.

Enabling vision for these children is indeed a highly rewarding experience.









## SANKARA'S STRONG PARTNERSHIPS WITH DONORS AND COMMUNITIES

Sankara is fortunate to have supporters and partners in the community across the US, who champion the cause by fundraising through events and donations. 

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## **CASE STUDY**

Dodanna, 70 year old farmer was living happily with his family of three daughters and two sons. He had a small farm that provided for his large family as well as the education of his children. His biggest worry was that having three daughters would surely shake up his financial stability.

Their village had only one school and after going through it, his children were expected to help with the farm. His

younger son wanted to go for further studies instead of helping in the farm. Unfortunately Dodanna was unable to afford to pay for the his son's further education since he needed the money to marry off his three daughters.

His son could not get himself to help his father in farming. His thoughts were with his friends who had joined the city for higher studies. One morning Dodanna

saw his son simply sitting and dreaming, he asked him to come and help him in the fields, but his son refused. Dodanna got angry and shouted at his son and carried on with his work.

By noon, when he was working in the fields, the villagers came running, to inform the shocking news that his son had committed suicide. Dodanna was shattered by this incident. He was not able to work in the fields anymore.

After about a year, for want of any other options, Dodanna had to sell his farm and used that money to get all his daughters married.

With the farm gone, Dodanna, his wife and older son started working in others' fields as laborers. After his son got married, he left his village to start a new life in the neighboring village.

As days passed by, Dodanna's vision started getting blurred. Soon, he found it difficult to work in the field and was worried that if he couldn't work, they will go without food for days.

Luckily, his neighbors showed him the pamphlet of Sankara Eye Camp. Dodanna attended the camp and from there he was taken to Sankara Eye Hospital, Bangalore for surgery.

Life, once again has brightened for him and his family, thanks to the good vision which he regained after the surgery at Sankara. He has since gone back to his village as a new man with renewed enthusiasm and confidence to face the future and take care of the family.
